In January it was brought to our attention that Don was in need of a T.A.P. home phone because he is hard of hearing. Don does not use a hearing aid and was looking for a cordless phone because he does a lot of work out in his shop at the house. Don and his wife came to our Warrensburg office for a demonstration. Don liked the way the XLC2 worked because of the bright light it flashed when the phone would ring. It was easy for him to grip the phone while holding it as well as also being able to hear and understand clearly the caller on the other end.



Once the XLC2 arrived, our TAP Coordinator Sam drove out to his house and helped set the phone up. Once we had the phone adjusted for Don and he practiced a phone call, his eyes just lit up. You could see the joy on his face now being able to clearly hear on the new phone. At one point he said "it is almost too loud". Don's wife Betty was stunned that something could actually sound too loud for Don. They were both so excited to now have a way that Don could communicate without difficulty. Don and Betty joked that they could use it as a pager if he was in the shop, so she could call him to come inside. They were both so appreciative of receiving the phone and services, and the positive impact it is making on their everyday lives."

Money Follows the Person (MFP)

My name is Skyler and I am the Money Follows the Person Transition Coordinator at WILS. The MFP program is a grant funded by the Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) and is designed to help Missouri Medicaid eligible individuals move from the nursing home back into the community. The goal is to assist individuals with resources that will allow them to live independently with the help of community based services, such as the Consumer Directed Services (CDS) program or in-home services. The grant money the consumer receives (\$2,400) is used to move them into their own home, covers the first month rent and deposit, helps with utilities, living essentials, and anything else that allows the consumer to live independently. This summer has proved to be quite a busy time for the MFP program here at WILS. We have transitioned several consumers already this year and will be transitioning many more this fall. If you have a loved one living in a nursing home and you feel they could potentially live on their own but just need a little help getting there, please contact me in the Warrensburg office at 660-422-7883. We want everyone to be able to live and age in place where they feel the most comfortable!

WILS' five core services are information and referral, independent living skills training, advocacy, peer support and transition.

For individuals, WILS offers supportive programs including accessible ramp construction, low cost accessible transportation, Consumer Directed Services, assistive technology, and help to transition from an institution to independent community living. We can also assist eligible participants to obtain adaptive telephone and computer equipment through Missouri's Telecommunications Access Program.

In addition, WILS staff can guide businesses and organizations through the process of performing accessibility surveys and implementing transition plans to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.
