"Jennifer, my house is a wreck," Debra said. "A big tree came through my house, and the back of the house is lying in my front yard."

When a powerful tornado ripped through her town, Debra and her granddaughter had nowhere to go. WILS IL Case Manager Jennifer had a visit scheduled that morning and quickly stepped in. "Just breathe — I'll talk with my supervisor and see what we can do," she said.

While WILS was helping Debra get settled in temporary lodging, she got word her insurance would cover three nights at the hotel. Jennifer continued to check on Debra daily, offering steady support and advocacy. Thanks to WILS efforts and Debra's own determination, she and her granddaughter now have housing in senior apartments. "I feel safe and very thankful," Debra shared.

With support from WILS, her insurance, and the Salvation Army, Debra is safe and rebuilding. Her story is one of resilience, resourcefulness, and the power of community — proof that even in the storm's aftermath, no one has to face recovery alone.

This fundraiser supports WILS programs that provide essential resources, services, and support for people with disabilities.

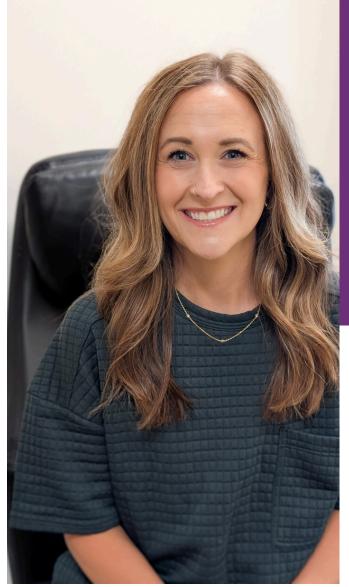

She also coteaches American Sign Language classes to promote inclusive communication and stronger community connections.

### One Step at a Time

#### ED RECLAIMS HIS STRENGTH

After months of determination and hard work, Ed is celebrating a victory that once seemed out of reach — taking steps on his own and transferring without assistive equipment.

Since April, Ed has been attending physical therapy three times a week. At the start of this journey, Ed was almost entirely dependent on his family. He was confined to his bed, and his wife had to rely on assistive devices, such as a sit-to-stand lift, to move him from bed to his wheelchair. Every transfer required equipment and effort.

But last week, everything changed. Ed accomplished a huge milestone: he walked four feet — three separate times in one day — using a walker. Then came another proud moment that filled his wife with joy and hope.

After a ride with WILS Transportation, Ed's wife excitedly phoned to share the news: "Today was the first time I hadn't had to use the sit-to-stand device to get him from the bed to the wheelchair," she said. "I was able to just assist him with the transfer instead of having to get equipment out." In the background, Ed let out a triumphant, unmistakable celebration: "WooHoo!" You could hear the pride in his voice — just being able to transfer with his wife's help instead of relying on devices marked a major step forward in his independence.

WILS Transportation has played a key role in Ed's progress. As his only form of transportation, it has made it possible for him to access the physical therapy that's helped make these incredible changes possible.

Ed's story is a powerful reminder of how consistent support, hard work, and access to the right resources can help people reclaim independence and quality of life — one step at a time.
